Changes Coming to OHC

Operation Hungry Child started as Spenser's non-profit affiliate in our commitment to fight child hunger but as we continue to grow and expand, we decided that some housecleaning needed to be done. And what better time than spring? Not that we are throwing anything away, just re-organizing and streamlining some of our objectives and operations.

- We are debuting our new logo that will focus more on children and less on Spenser (although he will continue to be our "front dog" in the war on hunger).
- We are launching a mother-child initiative with the introduction of *ElephantShooz* in May.
- We are introducing a line of personalized children's books (more on this fun thing later).
- We are continuing to work on the Pepsi Refresh

project idea, Apple A Day, to mount a nationwide initiative teaming with pediatricians and grocery stores to address underfed children in our communities.

Pretty ambitious? Yes, it is and we are very excited about all of our plans.

starting with the package that was required when we entered.



The Child Feeding Project which finds its home in the Feeding America West Michigan Food Bank located in Grand Rapids, Michigan, is just getting off the ground. OHC has experience in these programs and was keen to help. Lindsey worked with Nancy Ullrey, Agency Relations Manager, to ensure that our goals and objectives all lined up and a funds award was made in March.

Operation Hungry Child also hosted for the second year a Christmas party for the children at the Kayton Homes Kids Cafe. This is the Kids Cafe featured in the *Spenser's Savannah* book. Melanie, Will, and a group of helpers fed and entertained the children. Each child was given a copy of *Spenser Goes to El Paso* to add to their home reading collection. The children look forward to this visit from Spenser and a chance to share some holiday spirit.



The Spanish language edition of *Spenser Goes to El Paso* is making inroads in the southwest Texas areas. Ben spent time in November working with the Chamber of Commerce and the tourism bureau to determine how we could meet common objectives. It looks like the plan will be to use the Spenser book to introduce event planners to the El Paso area and stress the area's strong Hispanic roots. Proceeds go to the West Texas Food Bank.

An Apple A Day - An Awareness Project

Operation Hungry Child was thrilled to be a finalist in Pepsi's grant-awarding contest. Our goals were lofty and we were pitted against a number of veteran money-raising organizations with full-time staffs. Unfortunately, we didn't win. Fortunately, we discovered what great friends and fans we have. We also learned we have unqualified support for our project, An Apple A Day (AAD). So we plan to continue to search for funds to see it through - which means new opportunities in grant-writing and proposal seeking.

Apple A Day has three main objectives:

- Raise awareness of child hunger in America


- Address the problem of underfed/malnourished children
- Engage those who can make a difference in their local communities

In short, An Apple A Day involves interaction between parents/children and three separate groups.

Operation Hungry Child will develop and produce a children's activity book/workbook about nutrition featuring Spenser.

Pediatrician groups will distribute to children when they visit for well child checkups.

Participating grocers will redeem specific pages in the book for an apple (when completed and presented by the child).



A timeline has not been established yet for AAD although we do hope to complete the design phase and begin production this year.

OHC is in the process of applying for grants to fund the venture.
